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God is love. Jesus is God. Jesus is love.

Be vigilant to be good and to do good. This world may not always recognize the importance of that good but do not underestimate what God sees, knows, and does for and about those who love Him and one another, who do good for Him and for one another, who are honest, and who serve. You are never alone.

In the Gospels Jesus reiterates the sentiments of Sirach. The Sermon on the Mount, through the Beatitudes He guides us to lead as servants, to care for those who suffer in mind, in body, in heart and in

His Mercy is endless. But we must be careful not to be self-righteous but always maintain humility and honesty "in our thoughts, in our words, in what we have done and in what we have failed to do." The power of prayer and the act of prayer itself is a grace. Giving of ourselves, our gifts, and our surplus to serve is good. When we "do" for personal fulfillment over the need to serve others we lack understanding of the presence of the God in our lives. God is pure love and through prayer He can give us all we need to heal our spirit through His infinite love. We must also remember His Mother. She is perfection in praise to the Father. We can look to her as a model of a life of prayer in thanksgiving, in sorrow, and in love.
